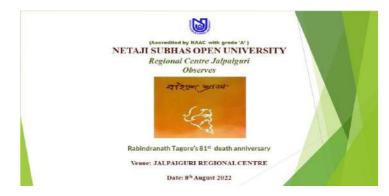


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Observation of Rabindra Tagore's Death Anneversary 22 se Srabon at RC-Jalpaiguri



One of the greatest men born in India was the renowned poet and freedom fighter Rabindranath Tagore. Called 'Gurudev' Tagore's thoughts and ideas motivate people and keep their love for the country alive even now. August 7, marks the 81st death anniversary of legendary Rabindranath Tagore. He had passed away this very day in the year 1941. Known for some of his masterpieces like 'Gitanjali', 'Ghare-Baire' and many more Tagore had made major cultural contributions in the field of art and literature. He is also known as the 'Bard of Bengal'. Tagore is the writer of India's national anthem 'Jana Gana Mana', as well as 'Amar Shonar Bangla', which is the national anthem sung in Bangladesh.



The Regional Centre Jalpaiguri of Netaji Subhas Open University observed 81 death anniversary of Rabindranath Tagore on 8th August. On this occasion, Deputy Director Sri Santanu Dam and Sri Ashif Ahamed garlanded the portrait of Tagore. Later Sri Santanu Dam addressed the gathering. He explained the significance of the day.
