The School of Social Sciences, Netaji Subhas Open University and NSOU Centre for Social Studies is jointly organizing Two-Day National Seminar Sponsored by the Department of Higher Education, Science & Technology and Bio-Technology, Government of West Bengal. The Title of the Seminar: Caste, Social Formation and Political Mobilization: Modern Bengal in Historical Context.

The Concept Note and other details are given below:

Concept Note

Caste is a historically determined phenomenon of the Indian society with social identifications and cultural attributions. In the pre-modern era, caste played very important role in the social structure of India as well as of Bengal. The introduction of British rule, the emergence of a modern form of economy and education, the rise of the new classes like the middle class or the working class and articulation of social reform movements in modern Bengal under the colonial rulers contributed to the formation of a new type of society in 19th century.

However, the rise of a new type of society under the dominance of the colonial rule does not imply the end of the importance of caste in the Bengali society. On the contrary, there was continuous interaction of caste and society in modern Bengal in multiple ways. And as a result of this complex interaction, caste question acquired certain new forms, meanings and identities in the expansive frontier of societal transformation from a pre-modern pre-colonial era to modern and colonial era. In other words, the absorption of bourgeois

property rule and norms of *capital*, as well as *class* in the Bengali society in the 19th century did not lead to the marginalization of caste as a social entity. Rather, caste as a category was able to mutate and transform itself through the invention of suitable strategy, tactics and ideology from time to time in the historical perspectives of modern Bengal.

It is needless to point out that in a socio-culturally differentiated society of Bengal, the ideological proposition and strategy-tactics algorithm of castequestion would be far from homogeneity and rigidity. In other words, the different castes developed their own ways not only to survive but also achieve progressof their community under the new conditions of colonial modernity. Obviously, it was not an uncontested form of social communication. The entire process faced obstacles and resistance so far as the articulation of the identities of depressed consciousness was concerned. The present seminar intends to explore this little-highlighted area of the contested social communication of the depressed class consciousness, the modalities of power manifestation, the formation of caste identities and frontier of the politics of possibility. The caste question needs to be analyzed also an expression of power and culture not only under the colonial terrain, but also under the post-colonial configuration. The establishment of parliamentary democracy and electoral politics in post-colonial India created new conditions for the development of caste politics with new dimensions. The present seminar will also explore these features of the Bengali society. It will also address the so-called 'myth' of the absence of caste consciousness and caste politics in the historical development of contemporary West Bengal.
