Folklore Studies in the Digital Age (2nd Cycle): Report


December 10, 2022 to February 12, 2023

Introduction

The Centre for Language, Translation, and Cultural Studies (CLTCS), School of Humanities, Netaji Subhas Open University, organised an online 8-week Short-Term Programme on Folklore Studies in the Digital Age held from December 10, 2022, and concluded on February 24, 2023. The course intends to introduce various methods and technological tools by providing a platform for practical training to perform archival work on folklore material on a digital platform. Since the participants included research scholars and faculty members across different streams and disciplines from all over India, the course was held via the Google Meet platform. The sessions were scheduled over the weekends for one and a half hour. Additionally, a few technical sessions were offered over the weekdays, and the medium of instruction was English. Besides, additional materials in the form of pre-recorded lectures and soft copies were provided to participants to understand the subject in a better way.

The field of folklore studies has undergone significant changes with the advent of digital technology. The traditional modes of collecting, documenting, and analyzing folklore have been replaced by new methods that incorporate digital tools and techniques. To train and equip researchers and scholars with these skills, an 8-week online short-term training program was organized on Folklore Studies in the Digital Age. The program focused on the basic idea of folklore, shifting paradigms in folklore studies, digital folkloristics, starting a project work, digitizing folklore elements, digital ethnography, selected tools for exploration, hands-on training, project work, and presentation. This report provides an overview of the program, its objectives, and outcomes.


The course advisors were Professor Manan Kumar Mandal, Director, School of Humanities, NSOU, and Professor Srideep Mukherjee, Head of the Dept. of English, NSOU. Dr Md. Intaj Ali, Assistant Professor of English at Netaji Subhas Open University & Assistant Coordinator of the Centre for Language Translation & Cultural Studies (CLTCS), NSOU, coordinated the course.



Inaugural session: (10/12/2022)

An inaugural session was conducted on December 10, 2022. Professor Manan Kumar Mandal addressed the inaugural Session (Prof. in Bengali and Director, School of Humanities & coordinator -CLTCS) along with Prof. Sharmishtha Chatterjee (Prof Dept. of English Language Teaching, NSOU) by welcoming all participants, resource persons, and speakers focusing on the core objectives and the scope of such short-term programs. Dr Md. Intaj Ali, Assistant Professor of English and Assistant Coordinator (CLTCS), NSOU, addressed the course's overview. He introduced the participants to the timeline and the various dimensions expected to be covered during the two-month programmes. Satabdi Das, PhD Research Scholar, Department of English, NSOU, concluded the session with a vote of thanks.

The session was concluded with a note of appreciation from all resource persons and speakers by congratulating the course coordinator Dr Md. Intaj Ali for this great initiative and future endeavours. Hence course's primary aim was to provide in-depth knowledge for scholars as well as a layman who could use the tools and methodology to study folklore.



Objectives:

The primary objective of the program was to provide participants with an in-depth understanding of the shifting paradigms in folklore studies and the ways in which digital technology has influenced the field. The program aimed to equip participants with the necessary skills to digitize folklore elements, conduct digital ethnography, and use selected tools for exploration. The program also aimed to provide hands-on training and guidance for participants to start a project work on the digital folklore project. The final objective of the program was to enable participants to present their project work in a clear and compelling manner.

Program Structure:



The program was structured into eight modules, each spanning one week. The first week focused on the basic idea of folklore and provided an overview of the field. The second week discussed the shifting paradigms in folklore studies and the impact of digital technology on the field. The third week focused on digital folkloristics and explored the ways in which digital technology has transformed the collection, documentation, and analysis of folklore. The fourth week provided guidance on starting a project work and introduced participants to the digital folklore project.

The fifth week focused on digitizing folklore elements and provided hands-on training on the use of various digital tools for collecting and documenting folklore. The sixth week focused on digital ethnography and introduced participants to the concept of ethnography in the digital age. The seventh week introduced selected tools for exploration and provided hands-on training on their use. The final week focused on project work and presentation and provided guidance on how to present project work in a clear and compelling manner.

In addition to the regular lecture sessions, Dr. Md Intaj Ali organized several meet-up sessions for the participants, including sharing pre-recorded lectures for self-paced learning.

One of the highlights of the program was a special lecture by renowned resource person Indranil Mukherjee, Founder of VIBGYOR, on Archival Editing with LR, which took place on January 20th, 2023.

The program also included four movie screenings, which were followed by engaging discussions. The movies screened were "Le chant des fous" by Georges Luneau, "Sama: Muslim Mystic Music of India" directed by Shazia Khan, "Indus Blues" directed by Jawad Sharif, and "Chhou Dance of Purulia" directed by Dr. Shaktipada Kumar, Assistant Professor of English at Coochbehar Panchanan Barma University.





Valedictory session



For online mode of conducting such programs ecosystem needs to be up to certain standard so as to cut the loss of time and improve the quality of communication.


