Learner Support: Separate sessions are to be procured for the learners of JMC department in the following ICT Initiatives of the University

- i) Muktak (Weekly 30-minute allotment)

The session may be allotted to record the audio clippings, subject to the availability of slots at the studio.

- ii) Live Studio for Anchoring sessions / Discussion programs (Weekly 1-hour)

It was proposed that the School may submit a detailed plan of work with a list of equipment and a budget to upgrade the Language Lab at Kalyani RC for the purpose.

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1. Review of the University

1.1 Introduction & Background

Netaji Subhas Open University (NSOU) is West Bengal's only State-aided Open University with over 4.5 lakh students. Since its inception in 25th November, 1997, NSOU, has been actively engaged in the development and qualitative expansion of higher education in the State through open and distance mode of teaching-learning, research, and extension activities. It stretches its outreach through various projects, seminars, symposiums, conferences and annual lectures at the national/international levels. The University offers Ph.D., postgraduate and undergraduate programmes in a variety of disciplines, apart from vocational programmes. As a testament to its quality and status, it was recently accredited with Grade-'A' by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council of India.

Equipped with well-resourced ICT support and a dedicated Centre for Online Education, the University hosts Six Schools of Studies and Five Innovative Centres offering various programs across multiple academic disciplines. Programs are crafted in consistent with the needs of the aspirants as a demand for knowledge in society and economy to acquire contemporary learning skills. Affordability, Accessibility, Quality, Equity and Inclusivity are the pillars of the University's vision of reaching the unreached and meeting the unmet.

The University offers Ph.D. programmes in different disciplines, fifteen under graduate and sixteen postgraduate, two 2nd Degree Programmes (undergraduate) and a number of short-term vocational and skill development programmes under its six Schools of Studies viz. School of Humanities, School of Social Sciences, School of Sciences, School of Education, School of Professional Studies and School of Vocational Studies. Since its inception, the University has developed its own eco-system over the period to fulfil the dreams of thousands of learners.

The University has set up Centres under the aegis of different Schools of Studies for widening its reach. These Centres are entrusted with extension activities, outreach programme, research collaborations, skill development programme etc., namely:

- ✚ Centre for Lifelong Learning (under the aegis of School of Vocational Studies)
- ✚ Centre for Language, Translation & Cultural Studies (under the aegis of School of Humanities)
- ✚ Centre for Disability Studies & Educational Research (under the aegis of School of Education)
- ✚ Centre for Social Studies (under the aegis of School of Social Sciences)
- ✚ Centre for Propagation of Scientific Knowledge (under the aegis of School of Sciences)
- ✚ Innovation and Incubation Centre (under the aegis of School of Professional Studies)

NSOU has been catering to a very heterogeneous learner base both in terms of age group and socio-economic background. Given all these factors, the matrix of our operations includes both conventional academic areas as also vocational courses that are aimed at skill-development. NSOU operates through three Regional Centres (Kalyani, Durgapur, Jalpaiguri) and 175 Learner Support Centres across the state of West Bengal.

An appraisal of the existing system will give a better conception and understanding of the University's strengths and opportunities to lessen the weaknesses, overcome the challenges

and help develop a road map in the changing milieu of higher education in the local-national-global continuum. NSOU has made gradual yet phenomenal progress over the last 26 years of its existence.

The 1st meeting of the duly constituted NEP Cell of the University was convened to discuss the various aspects of NEP 2020 especially the implementation of the National Curriculum and Credit Framework at NSOU in view of the letter received from the WB State Council of Higher Education, GoWB [Vide Memo No. 71(31)/NEP/SCHE/2023 dated 31/3/2023]. The Directors and Heads were also requested to attend the meeting. All the members participated in the deliberations and discussed the prospects and challenges of the implementation of the National Curriculum and Credit Framework in the July 2023 academic session at the university.

After threadbare discussions, the following points emerged:

1. The university has to prepare the Self Learning Materials (SLMs) for all its courses. For any Open University, it is mandatory to provide the SLMs to the students. In view of this, within a short period of time, it may not be possible to prepare the SLMs as per guidelines laid down in the UGC (ODL Programmes and Online Programmes) Regulations 2020. The revision of the syllabus and preparation of Self Learning Materials (SLMs) as per the requirements of the UGC may take one year or so.
2. The university may organize workshops to sensitize the academic and administrative staff on various requirements of the National Curriculum and Credit Framework for the university.
3. The university has already submitted the Programme Project Reports (PPRs) based on the existing course structure, syllabus and SLMs for approval of thirty-three (33) programmes (17- Under Graduate Degree programmes under CBCS and 16-Post Graduate Degree programmes) to the UGC-Distance Education Bureau (DEB). The feedback from UGC-DEB is yet to be received.

4. The University operates through its duly approved Learner Support Centres (LSCs) which are housed in the undergraduate degree colleges affiliated with other universities across the State of West Bengal. The opinion of the Principals (host heads) of the LSCs may also be sought.
5. All the Directors of the Schools may be included in the NEP Cell.
6. A comparative statement was placed before the members for the possible implementation of the National Curriculum and Credit Framework at NSOU. The table gives the status of the courses to be developed as per the requirement of NC&CF of the UGC.
