### Centre for Propagation of Scientific Knowledge (CPSK) (under the aegis of School of Sciences, Netaji Subhas Open University)

### About the Centre

The Centre for Propagation of Scientific Knowledge (for short CPSK), under the aegis of the School of Sciences (SoSci), Netaji Subhas Open University (NSOU), is a center to study, accumulate and disseminate the scientific knowledge and understanding to the society connecting all the academic departments of the School of Sciences. The 'Centre for Propagation of Scientific Knowledge' has been established with prior approval of the Honourable Vice Chancellor of NSOU in terms of Memo No. VC/15/1643 dated 15.07.2022. CPSK shall undertake to disseminate scientific knowledge by stimulating and supporting scientific interactions and communications between the faculties and different interested stakeholders through workshops and seminars, short-term courses, collaborative programs, discipline-specific and multi-disciplinary researches, presentations and publications in different forms. CPSK will function according to the following guidelines under the aegis of SoSci, adhering to the University's general rules laid down from time to time.

### 1. Vision of the Centre

The vision of CPSK is to engage persons of all fields and irrespective of ages in science. In particular, the Centre envisions to enable students to cultivate and enrich science education, research, innovation, and communication. CPSK will work towards promoting science and technology within the jurisdiction of the University and developing human resource leading to strengthening the scientific capability. Through various programmes and activities, CPSK aspires to contribute to society by training learners, academics, working professionals and other interested persons to widen their knowledge and skills suitable for their careers. The Centre will also promote fundamental and inter-disciplinary research.

### 2. Objectives/ Mission of the Centre

- i. To popularise and cater information and knowledge in science and technology for the benefit of learners / persons of all fields and irrespective of ages.
- ii. To portray the growth of science and technology and their application in the environment, industry, and human welfare.
- iii. To develop a scientific attitude and temper and to create, instill and sustain a general awareness amongst the people.
- iv. To impart valuable skills that prepare students for careers in various areas, including academia.
- v. To empower the teacher community to effectively apply modern scientific knowledge in their classroom teachings.
- vi. To promote research, innovation and publication in scientific fields.
- vii. To provide infrastructure and learning resources required for quality education and research activities.

### 4. Committee of the Centre

a. The Vice-Chancellor: Ex-Officio Chairperson, CPSK

b. The Director / Officer-in-Charge, SoSci : Ex-Officio Coordinator, CPSK

c. Finance Officer: Ex-Officio Member, CPSK

The Vice-Chancellor, is authorized to nominate six (6) members (out of the eight constituent departments), from amongst the substantive faculty members of SoSci for a period of three years from the date of nomination in consultation with the Director / Officer-in-Charge, SoSci,, in the following manner:

i. one of the Members as the Assistant Coordinator of CPSK;

ii. one of the Members as the Treasurer of CPSK;

iii. remaining four (4) as the Members of CPSK.

One senior professor of science / scientist of national acclaim shall also be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor as the Expert Member of CPSK.

### 5. Convening the Meeting

The Centre will hold its Meeting from time to time, preferably twice a year. The Coordinator of CPSK will convene it. The minutes of the meetings and the summary of activities of CPSK shall be reported in the next CIQA and Academic Council meetings of NSOU.

### 6. Functions of the Centre

v.

The CPSK will organise short-term training courses, certificate and diploma programmes, workshops, seminars, publications etc. The preferable duration of the programmes may be six to twelve months.

The constituent departments of the SoSci, NSOU, will submit the proposals for ii. organising the programmes. The department, the Centre, or the School may form an Expert Advisory Committee, if required. The faculties of the School of Sciences holding substantive post may also submit such proposal.

CPSK encourages the departments of the School of Sciences to submit iii. interdisciplinary project proposals to external agencies of various natures to fetch funds and provide project oriented services/outputs.

All the courses / programmes/ activities, as aforesaid, shall be self-financed in all iv. regards.

The duly constituted Evaluation Committee of CPSK will assess the training /

orientation/ certificate/ diploma course.

- CPSK will offer its programmes through online, offline, or blended modes as vi. deemed preferable. Keeping in mind knowledge-based learning, CPSK will make the various training and course materials available through OER repositories.
- To promote scientific research and innovation, the CPSK will publish books (edited vii. volumes), periodicals, and bulletins in print and/or electronic media.
- The CPSK may promote collaborative partnerships with HEIs and private enterprises viii. (PPP model), with due permission of the Vice-Chancellor, NSOU.

### 7. Financial Functions of the Centre

The CPSK will function as a self-financing and sustaining entity.

ii. The CPSK will have a bank account with Indian Bank, Salt Lake City Branch. The account will be operated by the coordinator and Assistant coordinator of CPSK as joint signatories.

iii. All the financial procedures relating to Accounting and Budgetary issues of CPSK

shall be guided by the extant Financial Rules of NSOU.

iv. The account statements of the CPSK will be audited yearly by a duly qualified auditor/ audit firm.

v. The CPSK may raise donations from various trusts/ societies/ institutions/ individuals to expand its academic fields of study and entitled to raise funds through projects from different Government/ Non-Government/ Industrial sources.

vi. After successfully completing a course/ programme and paying all the operational costs, the extra funds raised by the course/ programme shall be retained by CPSK and may be utilized within the SoSci, subject to the approval of the Vice-Chancellor, NSOU.

vii. The remuneration of External Experts shall be included in the budget of the course/programme proposal submitted by the organising constituent department of SoSci.

### 8. Electronic Platforms of the CPSK

The CPSK will have its own website to communicate information about its activities. This website may be linked to the official website of NSOU. The CPSK may employ its official social media handles on Facebook, Twitter, and Telegram platforms to increase its reach. The Center may maintain a YouTube channel where course contents, seminar/ workshop lecture videos, etc., may be posted.

### 9. Govt./Semi-Govt./Autonomous Institution/Private Enterprise Linkage

- The CPSK, for its activities and to promote research, may generate funds by applying for Grants from Govt./Semi-Govt./Autonomous Institutions/ other funding agencies. All such applications shall be routed sequentially through the Coordinator and Chairperson of CPSK / competent authority of NSOU.
- ii. The CPSK, subject to approval of the Chairperson, shall, as and when required, may enter into a Strategic partnership and Memorandum of Understanding (MOUs) for collaborative activities with societies, Private Enterprises, and Institutions. In that case, the Coordinator of the CPSK shall be the signatory of contracts or agreements. Terms and Conditions laid down by NSOU shall be followed in all regards for these matters.
- 10. If by reason of any provision of the aforesaid clauses, any difficulty arises in giving effect to these provisions, of legal or other nature, the Chairperson of CPSK shall refer such difficulty to the Competent Authority / legal expert of the NSOU which / who may make such decision / order or do such thing not inconsistent with the provisions of these Clauses, as appears to it to be necessary or expedient for removing such difficulty. In all the cases, as aforesaid, the decision / order of such competent authority of NSOU as aforesaid shall be final.

M Ed Spl. Ed. (ID) - ODL programme was started in School of Education, NSOU from the session 2021 -2022 after obtaining proper approval from RCI and UGC-DEB. Initially the approval was given for one year. Hence, this year we again applied to RCI for its No Objection Certificate and we duly received NOC from RCI. Then we applied to UGC-DEB for its approval, but our appeal was rejected due to following reason:

"1. Inadequate faculty as per provisions of the Regulations for the proposed programme.

2. Further, the appointment letters of the faculties are only for three months period."

### Our observations

1. Out of five faculties required for running two programmes - B. Ed. Spl. Ed. and M. Ed. Spl. Ed. - we have two permanent Asst. Professors and the rest three are superannuated contractual faculties appointed for three months period and renewed every three months on their satisfactory service.

2. Moreover the Director of School of Education is also superannuated and his appointment is also renewed every three months.

3. Hence, at present the appointments of the Director of SoE and the superannuated faculties need to be extended for at least one year.

4. Then we may proceed for further application to RCI and UGC-DEB for granting approval of M. Ed. Spl. Ed. - ODL in the month January, 2023.

No. 1-23/2021 (DEB-I) dated 14th July, 2021, mentioning therein that the online portal for submitting applications shall be open upto 31.07.2021. The last date for submitting duly Bengal had submitted its application for recognition of the Open and Distance Learning Programmes.

Application received from the Netaji Subhas Open University, Rollians, West Bengal had been scrutinized and deficiency(s) or defect(s) in application were communicated to HEI as per the University Grants Commission (Open and Distance Learning Programmes and Online Programmes) Regulations, 2020 and its amendment to remove or rectify such deficiency(s) or defect(s) with relevant documentary evidence.

Based on the recommendations of Interface Expert Committee and its approval by Competent Authority/Commission, I am directed to issue this Order, thereby communicating the programme wise recognition for the programmes to be offered in Open and Distance Learning mode from academic year 2021-22, academic session beginning November, 2021(revised from July, 2021) by the Netaji Subhas Open University, Kolkata, West Bengal as detailed in

For the programmes not recognized as per S(ii) above, as applicable, the Higher Educational Institution may prefer an appeal to the Commission within a period of 30 days from the date of uploading of Interface Meeting assessment Sheet 18.11.2021 on UGC, DEB portal as per the provision at sub-regulation (1) of Regulations 6 of Part-II of the University Grants Commission (Open and Distance Learning Programmes and Online Programmes) Regulations, 2020.
- 11. As stipulated under Sub-Regulation 7 of Regulations 5 of the University Grants Commission [Open and Distance Learning Programmes and Online Programmes] Regulations, 2020;

"No Higher Educational Institution shall offer any Open and Distance Learning Programme and/or Online Programme and admit learners thereto unless it has been granted recognition by the Commission and admission shall not be made in anticipation of the recognition\*.

#### Specific Provisions for Compliance

- The Higher Educational Institution shall comply to all the terms and conditions mentioned in the Affidavit 07.10.2021 duly notarized and signed by Sh. Kishore Sengupta Registrar submitted to the Commission vide letter dated 11.10.2021.
- 2) Intake capacity under Open and Distance Learning mode for a programme under science discipline
  - For Dual Mode University: Intake shall not be more than three times of the approved intake in conventional mode.
  - For Open University: Learning enrolment will commensurate with the capacity of the Learner Support Centres to provide lab facilities to the admitted learners.
- 3) The Higher Educational Institution shall scrupulously abide by all the terms and conditions of faculty and staff requirements for offering ODL/ Online programmes as mentioned in University Grants Commission Open and Distance Learning Programmes and Online Programmes) Regulations, 2020.
- 4) The total deployment of work force and other support at study or Learner Support Centres in Open and Distance Learning mode shall be as mentioned in Regulations.
- 5) Higher Educational Institution shall conduct proctored examination as under-
  - For ODL Programmes: Examination through pen-paper or online or computer based testing within Territorial Jurisdiction, in the examination centre as condition laid down in Regulations.
  - For Online Programmes: Examinations either using technology enabled online test with all the security arrangements ensuring transparency and credibility of the examinations, or through the Proctored Examination and in conformity with any other norms for such examination as may be laid down by the Commission
- 6) Higher Educational Institution offering programmes in Open and Distance Learning mode shall ensure that a Learner Support Centre is established as per Regulations and it also fulfill following conditions as under:
  - Learner Support Centre defined under these regulations shall not be the Learner Support Centre for more than two Higher Educational Institutions at a time to offer programmes in ODL mode.
  - Private University established under the State Act shall be eligible to offer programmes under Open and Distance Learning mode through its Head Quarters; not through any Learner Support Centre.
  - Learner Support Centre will not be set up under a franchisee agreement in any case
- 7) Higher Educational Institution offering programme in ODL mode and Online mode shall prepare Self Learning Material as per Annexure-VI and Annexure-VII taking into consideration of the following:
  - At least 60 percent of Self Learning Materials shall be developed by the in-house faculty of the HEI
  - Remaining percent of the materials can be sourced from available resources such as other HEIs, Open Educational Resources (OER) and SWAYAM.
- 8) Higher Educational Institution shall adhere to the weightage for different components of assessments for Open and Distance Learning mode and Online mode as under:
  - Continuous or formative assessment (in semester): Maximum 30 per cent.
  - Summative assessment (end semester examination or term end examination): Minimum
     70 per cent.
- 9) Based on the Regulatory Authority recommendations/approval, the maximum intake and other condition will be as per the Regulatory Authority recommendation/approval




### Proceedings of the workshop

After completion of all semester the University will submit the total structure of the practicum to Rehabilitation Council of India for perusal and approval.







Dr. A. N Dey, Director, SoE presided over the meeting. He welcomed all the esteemed members and the four Principal Investigators of the NSOU-funded four minor research project.

# Background of the Research conclave:

Director-CIQA summarized the backdrop of the Research Conciave.

As resolved in the 8th & 9th CIQA meetings, proposals were invited from the full-time faculty members in substantive posts for research projects. On the basis of the recommendations of the duly constituted Project Selection Committee (PSC), financial assistance has been granted in favour of 04 faculties of SoE as Principal Investigators to carry out their projects (duration: Maximum 12 months). Apropos to this, as conceded in the 12th CIQA meeting, Research Conclave (RC) may be organized to review the progress of these university-funded research project. It is to be noted that 50% of research grants were released by CIQA/Finance

Dept. to these 04 faculties to carry out their projects. It was resolved that the Directors of the Schools may review the progress of these projects at the School level through meeting under RC. The first meeting under the Departmental Research Conclave was thus scheduled to review the project development and progress.

## Agendum of the RC:

To review the progress of NSOU-funded research projects sanctioned to the four faculties (under substantive post) of SoE for a period of one year.

Director, SoE invited each P.I to present the progress of the research project sanctioned to them. The detail observations are recorded below:

# I. P.I: Smt. Antara Choudhury

Title of the Project: Development of Online Module on 'Learning the Management of Children with Learning Disabilities'

Smt. Choudhury presented her development and progress of the entitled project through PPT. The online module is a 4-week course. An Academic Advisory Committee has been constituted for quality and auditing of the e-contents. The presentation raised that she is yet to receive e-text of module-III. AVL recordings are yet to be assigned. However, she is steadily keeping track of the editing and reviewing works of the online module through repeated reminders to the text-writers/editors. Several virtual meetings were conducted for orientation of the course developers during the past couple of months. In order to complete the entitled project successfullyshe requested for an extension of time.

# II. P.I: Mr. Prabir Naskar

Title of the Project: Development of Online Module on 'Learning the Management of Children with Autism Spectrum Disorder'

The online module is a 4-week course. An Academic Advisory Committee has been constituted for quality and auditing of the e-contents of the online module. Mr. Naskar's oral deliberation brought out few concerning areas on the text writers and editors. Orientation meet of the Course developers was conducted to orient and give hand-holding ready experience for the e-text development. AVL recordings for this purpose are yet to be mapped and assigned. He affably assured that repeated reminders are been given to the course developers for early submission of the remaining e-text. In order to complete the entitled project successfully he requested for an extension of time.

## Specific Observations for I & II:

The house acknowledged the need and rationale of the development of the online modules at the behest of ICT-enabled pedagogy of the University. Since the present online modules are a part of the existing B.Ed Spl Ed curriculum, Prof. Bhowmick and Prof. Ghosh advised the P.Is to incorporate the existing texts from the SLMs relevant to the current module. This would save time to complete the work in hand.

#### III.P.I: Dr. Papiya Upadhyay

Title of the Project: The Mind Space of Teachers in the context of Blended Learning (BL) at Higher Education Level

Dr. Upadhyay presented her progress of work through vivid PPT slides. According to her timeline of the project, she has completed 03 tool development (construction and standardisation). She has also initiated data collection through google forms. Out of 400 samples, she has collected 160 so far. In order to expedite the data collection process, she is planning for visits to respective areas allotted under the study. As the method of her study is mixed research, a workshop will be conducted in the month of Nov 2022 to gather qualitative data through Focussed Group Discussion (FGD).

# Specific Observations:

The house affirmed that the workshop must be organized without delay as it would fetch the vision and materialise the idea behind the work more significantly. They also suggested to visit HEIs in order to expedite the data collection process. The result chain of the work was appreciated by Prof. Mukhopadhyaya.

## IV. P.I: Dr. Parimal Sarkar

Title of the Project: Impact of ICT support on the Tribal Learners of Netaji Subhas Open University.

Dr. Sarkar delivered his progress through oral discussion and presented the tool development process and very soon likely to complete the tool standardisation process. He also mentioned that a Project Assistant has been sanctioned to assist him for data collection and analysis. He has also received permission from the competent authority of NSOU for fetching data on tribal learners enrolled under different programmes. Dr. Sarkar.

Specific Observations:

The house congratulated Dr. Sarkar for taking such a challenging study but at the same time expressed serious concerns in collecting relevant data within the time left in hand. Prof. Mukhopadhyaya, advised to complete the standardisation of the tool expeditiously. Prof. Bhowmick insisted to limit the items of the questionnaire to maximum 20 as the present raw tool has 50 items. Prof. Ghosh further advised him to immediately notify the advertisement for the Project Assistant and initiate the recruitment modalities at the earliest.

#### Generic resolutions:

The members unanimously affirmed the following:

- All the 04 P.Is are suggested to complete the project within the stipulated time (as per project sanction letter received from the Registrar Deptt) without delay.
- Failing to meet the deadline, the concerned P.I may request for an extension of date for completion and submission of the entitled research project through the Director, SoE to the Registrar/CIQA.
- The remaining 50% of the sanctioned amount may be released to the respective 04 P.Is on receipt of the UC of the 50% of the already disbursed financial assistance to carry out the project as per project sanction letter from the Registrar Department.

The meeting concluded with exchanging thanks to and from the Chair.

## Report

This is the Report of the One day National Webinar organized by the Department of Sociology under the School of Social Sciences, NSOU in collaboration with the NSOU Centre for Social studies on 23.09.22 from 11.00 am to 4pm on the Theme: Giving voice to the voiceless? : The sociology of identity politics in Contemporary India on the occasion of the seventy fifth year of independence, Amrit Mahotsav.

## The Seminar itinerary

The Inaugural session of the seminar was initiated by the Welcome address given by Professor, Chandan Basu, Director, School Of Social Sciences, NSOU. It was followed by the Inaugural Address by Professor Asit Baran Aich, The Registrar, NSOU. Thereafter the august keynote address was delivered by Professor Anand Kumar, Department Of Sociology, JNU. The address was succeeded by the illuminated Presidential Address delivered by Professor Abha Chauhan, Department Of Sociology, Jammu University and President, Indian Sociological Society. The inaugural session came to an end by the vote of thanks by the undersigned.

#### Key note address

Professor Kumar in his Key note address tried weaving the ideas of equality, freedom, justice and mobilization of the voiceless. He said, in an extremely stratified society like ours where constitutional equality has already been proclaimed, the significance of the voiceless becomes more nuanced over the time. Attempts had been made to treat the very concept of identity in terms of value perception and as a consequence of the social structure. It is necessary to taste democracy to understand the rule of freedom and the rule of law. Unless we understand this, we cannot gauge the trauma of the voiceless-ness. With the lumpenization of the public sphere, we have understood that the nation building

is an important challenge for a great civilization like India which had been assaulted by two hundred years of imperialism that had bestowed it with a prolonged sense of voiceless-ness. The idea of India has gone through a paradigm shift and the successors of the this grand structure who bear the legacy of communalism, casteism and regionalism, tradition, modernity and social change had to continue their conversation with reality. Nation and nationalism are not the two sides of the same coin because nations are built on wee feeling which must be supported by political, economic and social justice. Hierarchies should not be converted into frozen steps of inclusion and social exclusion but instead they must remain fluid and fine by the judiciary system and common wisdom. This challenge of nation building is a serious challenge and if this is thwarted, it becomes consolidated into voiceless-ness. The vice of the British imperialism created more voicelessness than ver. The freedom struggle was fought because the right to speech was jeopardized and voice was the privilege of the elites and the ruled and the dominated. The struggle was made because the voicelessness was perpetuated by denying basic rights like expressing opinions and stand points. Great thinkers like Lokmanya Tilak and Mahatma Gandhi were arrested because they expressed their own convictions. People like Netaji and Jawaharlal Nehru and many others were arrested because they expressed their minds through public speeches that did not gel well with the imperialists. Our constitutional preamble says we have the basic rights to express our free thoughts, ideas and faith and these must not be denied.

We then started our voyage for democracy wherein we embarked on the journey from voiceless-ness to rights for representation. After few years of consolidation of our national democracy, since 1960s, we witness a new trend of politics of caste, region, ethnicity, religion which we call the fissiparous tendencies that were compared with tendencies of separatism. We thought these tendencies are seizing our political freedom and justice that were not congenial with national unity. Since 1970s we find the rise of regional parties governing various provinces that recognized the idea of federalization. We started acknowledging inevitability and importance of the ethnic and regional parties. We started appreciating the status and existence of such regional parties. Especially, Tamil Nadu became the focus of national debates and strife because Tamilians were organizing their regional parties in line with national

parties like Congress and giving due recognition to regional parties like the Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (DMK) and the All India Anna Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (AIADMK). This was not to say that Tamil Separatism was growing but that plurality and multiculturalism was ushered in Tamil Nadu. The first Indian language that was used in parliament after Hindi was undoubtedly Kannad. Veerendra Patil who went on to become the chief Minister of Karnataka insisted that Kannad language be spoken in parliament since he was representing the Kannad people. Multilingualism was encouraged and it was made a point that regional languages other than Hindi was used copiously in the public sphere.

However, it is disappointing to find that the official language to be used in the Supreme Court was only English that of course repressed the multi-linguist approach that we so far had been talking of. Soon after the constitution of the Mandal commission probed the status of the other back ward castes and classes and resolved to give them more visibility in the public forum. After the submission of the Mandal commission report, it was increasingly recognized that the other Back ward castes and classes must be given due attention. One of the most pertinent trends in the Indian democracy is the proliferation of the Dalit movement. The meaning of 'Dalit' had undoubtedly acquired newer political and ideological shades that had undoubtedly triggered newer debates of identity and identity formulation across the multiple conjunctions of reality.

It was interesting to note that the key note address that was delivered contained the key elements of voiceless-ness with which we must negotiate such as firstly, the need to eliminate the caste hierarchy that had been entrenched in the social order. Secondly, the deprived sections of the society especially those belonging to the primary sectors of the economy such as peasants, artisans, farmers and the Adivasi. Thirdly, the problem of linguistic plurality must be emphasized such that other than the grand languages, even regional languages must be also be given equal footage. Thousands of languages have perished away in dearth of proper sustenance and legislation. Though there are exceptions such as some Dalit writers who are very articulate and expressive. There are also some political leaders who are more articulate than the others However, exception does not make rule. Fourthly, it is gender which is still struggling as a category to claim voice for itself. There are again interesting exceptions like Mamta Banerjee in West Bengal, Rabri

Devi in Bihar and Mayawati, the erstwhile chief minister of Uttar Pradesh. But the question of gender and its representation is still very mucky now. The poverty is the fifth factor contributing to voicelessness. Of course, the trade union movements in the remote agrarian states is still governed by the middle class leaders. But, of course such ideology do not get due place in policies and programmes drafted for the state. Sixthly, it is religion which suffers from the malady of voice-lessness. Only a few national religions get exposure while the rest others are drowned into the darkness of invisibility and morbidity. The minorities must get their due place in the trajectory of social change towards the accreditation of their identity.

It is expected that ethnicization of mobility, religious heterogeneity and due recognition to the muffled voices coming from the unexposed corners of civilization must get their due place. In this struggle for freedom, rights and Swaraj, we must not forget to respect ourselves and our kinsmen as well as give reverence to those others struggling to acquire a footing on the socio-political panorama of the Indian civilization. We as sociologists must question the concept of voiceless-ness and strive hard to accommodate those voices by crafting a more inclusive space for them.

#### The Presidential address

The key note address was followed by the Presidential address delivered by Professor Abha Chowhan. She in her presidential address also mooted on the ideas of voicelessness, especially the ideas of cultural voice-lessness and its consequences for the Indian society. She gave resplendent examples from the everyday lives of Jammu's composite culture especially those enshrining the popular deity of Vaishno Devi to contextualize the theme in local parlance across a wide global backdrop. She said, 'plurality' is always a better word than 'diversity' because we are not just considering the other to be important but also at the same time accepting him or her on the same plane with enough resilience and accommodation, which is more important. She also discussed the theoretical paradigms and the paradigm change of deconstructing the meta-narratives to give voice to those on the margins. The inaugural session came to an end with Vote of Thanks delivered by the undersigned.

#### The technical sessions I and II

The technical sessions I and II soon followed with paper presentations from twenty three presenters across the country (Appendix-1), making the webinar truly 'national' in its scope. They participated very actively with vibrant illustrations and absorbing analysis. The 1st technical session was presided over by Professor Abha Chowhan and Dr. Kumkum Sarkar, Associate Professor of Sociology, NSOU and coordinated by Sri Ajit Kumar Mondal, Associate Professor of Sociology, NSOU. The second session was coordinated by Sri Anupam Ray, Assistant Professor of Sociology, NSOU and chaired over by Sri Ajit Mondal. The technical sessions were coupled with an interactive session which made the Webinar even more enthralling and compelling. The day came to an end with a note of thanks to all the participants from the organizing secretary for making the Webinar a grand a success.

### The takeaways from the webinar

- We are celebrating the seventy-fifth year of independence with much pomp and show and the extravagance is steeped in every layer of the society we take stride of. The papers reminded us that we should not forget that we live in a severely stratified society where almostevery socket has its own ethno-graph to narrate. The narration becomes even sostriking since the very last decade of the 20<sup>th</sup> century that witnessed galvanizing and far sighted changes. It had redefined the Indian polity through an interesting yet intensifying interface between caste, class, gender and ethnic identities.
- The presentations pointed out that the liberalization and the concomitant economic reforms championed a new phase of development which made India embark on a new journey since the 1990s withits own promises and challenges. The period remained entrenched with many strains, some of which were manipulated by the political system itself for extra electoral leverages. The era saw an unprecedented rise of diverse plural categories and backward classes which had already lost voices for decades.
- The webinar pointed out that the society was myopic of such groups and so was the polity which refused to accommodate such plural but undermined

groups. Their voices went unheard and drowned in the cacophony of political rhetoric and shrill meta-narratives.

• The papers devised ways so that that the unvoiced were represented and patted with concern, at least the polity must hear their murmurs. They showed that the muffled voices were beginning to marshal some identity though smeared by the accoutrements of crafty politics. Hence we can visualize an era which automated the dispensations of identity politics that is soon to radicalize the socio-political landscape of the Indian society with the shades of social inclusion and adaptation.

However, whether the new regime would bring any solace to the emaciated is doubtful and that is what we were debating in this weminar. We didn't start with any presumption but only presented the timeline of the reorganization of the state and the polity to record the morphed picture of the backward and the minority categories. We dialogued incessantly that whether at all the excluded groups have carved out some niche for themselves or is it only a cosmetic change pretending ostentatious welfare.

#### The questions that we had left behind

- Is new Indian polity and society facilitating social inclusion or is it a farce after all?
- Is the very process of politicizing the identity formations help bring some relief to those teetering on the margin?
- Or is it all illusion for the masses and optimization for the handful? These are someof the basic questions we left behind as the food of thought.

#### Outcomes of the Webinar:

- 1. We sensitized the young minds with very relevant themes concerning Indian polity and society. The deliberations made them more resourceful and conscious as well as judiciously responsible scholars as well as citizens. We were successful in producing a handful of sensitive and responsible citizens, which is the emergent need of the hour. The themes we touched were the vibrant topics of Indian polity such as:

MoU / agreement delineating the terms & conditions for printing and purchase of title etc. as needed, will be signed between School of Humanities & Dey's Publishing house in consultation with the competent authority accordingly.
- b) Up-to-date list of selected text and necessary write-ups will be supplied to the publisher by the Department of Bengali following the due procedure.
- c) Concerned publisher will manage and complete all paraphernalia regarding the publication of such compendium. NSOU will have no responsibility regarding the copyright issues of any text material printed therein, however holds the editorial right.

#### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

Between Bangladesh Open University And

Centre for Language, Translation & Cultural Studies (CLTCS)

School of Humanities Netaji Subhas Open University



#### PREAMBLE

1. Bangladesh Open University (BOU) and Netaji Subhas Open University (NSOU) authorities have agreed to cooperate and collaborate different academic initiatives in the educational arena for the institutional mutual interest. This joint academic effort is intended to help develop expanding the open-to-open (Open University to Open University) partnership horizon for furthering education and research activities in international arena for the enhancement of knowledge-based society in Bengal Basin. Towards the open to open partnership initiative the Bangladesh Open University (BOU), represented by its Vice Chancellor, and Netaji Subhas Open University (NSOU), represented by its Vice Chancellor, have agreed to collaborate the following areas of their institutional academic arena.

#### ARTICLE 1: SCOPE

2. That this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is intended to facilitate the collaborative research initiatives on Bengal Partition & the Liberation War of Bangladesh and its aftermath, between the two universities of which Centres/ Departments/Schools are involved, to develop & upgrade the digital repository on the subject namely Bengal Partition Repository (BPR) as developed by the NSOU, for storing the oral history and personal documents in the form of video/audio and print.

#### ARTICLE 2: OBJECTIVES

3. That this academic research will be accomplished through collaborative efforts between Bangladesh Open University (BOU) and the CLTCS (Centre for Language, Translation & Cultural Studies) of Netaji Subhas Open University (NSOU). various ways viz., case to case or project basis which may include:

 Collaborative Research under the broad area of Partition & Liberation War studies to create an Open Repository for future research.

 Exchange of research and pedagogical materials and primary source materials to be collected from the people of Bangladesh & the adjacent state of India namely West Bengal

Field work for primary source data collection

Joint international conference, seminars, workshop and symposia

Joint publication of research material

 Additional cooperative initiatives (i.e. running joint programme, exchange of research materials, internship) as may be mutually agreed upon.

#### ARTICLE 3: COORDINATION

4. BOU and NSOU will each designate a representative or a School/Centre/body/ duly authorized by the relevant competent authority, who is to be responsible for the management of this MOU. Both parties agree to notify the other if the School/Centre/body/ or representative changes in the course of the agreement, and to, in turn, inform their respective international and/or administrative units.

#### **ARTICLE 4: AMENDMENTS**

Both the host institutions will hold the right of their existing rules & regulations and amendments in effect from time to time. All the committee members of host institution(s) will constitute the primary stakeholders of such collaborative research project. Internal arrangement/committees and functioning of such institution(s) shall not fall within the purview of such MOU. Both the institutions will extend their infrastructural support i.e. office, computer, internet connectivity, seminar hall, transportation etc. to run the project in good spirit within the ambit of existing rules & regulations of the concerned host institutions. The copy of the MOU thus evolved may be used by researchers in obtaining necessary travel documents as and when required. Such travel may be governed and planned under the norms of Cultural Exchange Programmes as may be decided upon by the partner institutions that are parties to this MOU.

#### ARTICLE 5: ACADEMIC ENGAGEMENT

6. Both the institutions agree to conduct this project with their best ability. Academic sharing and deliberations will be made in extremely spirited manner to explore the new areas of the proposed field of study. Action oriented plan under this collaborative research should be completed within a stipulated time. The timeframe for collaborative research will be agreed by the two parties (BOU & NSOU) and each project shall have details of background, objectives, methodology and implications. Each project shall have dissemination workshop/conferences/seminars where the participants from both the universities will attend. The project/or the university shall bear the participation cost.

#### ARTICLE 5: FIELD SURVEY RESEARCH

- 7. On the basis of selective sample, field survey will be organised to collect in audio-video format personal narratives of families across generations affected by Indian Partition and the Liberation war of Bangladesh. A team of researchers to be fixed/engaged by both the host institutions for field survey. Schedule of survey will be fixed on mutual convenience. Host institutions will arrange accommodation and food as per specification to be fixed by them. The detail of the pre-fixed specifications/offerings will be intimated mutually.
- 8. The details should be communicated to all concerned at any level of stake holding. Maximum span of survey on each visit will be 07 (seven) days at a stretch. One workshop each to be organized by either host institution to fix-up all the details regarding the survey before it starts.

The findings coming of the survey shall be treated as confidential by the host institutions till
the completion of the whole project. The publication thereof shall be a collaborative effort
based on mutual consent and with due acknowledgements.

## ARTICLE 6: WORKSHOPS/ SEMINAR UNDER THIS INITIATIVE

- 10. Maximum 2 (two) workshops/seminar will be organized; 1 (one) each by both institutions. It is preferable to organize a workshop or a seminar of 2 (two) days maximum, in mutually convenient schedules.
- 11. Workshop/Seminar will discuss the issues relating to the broad area of the Research Project. It will try to explore new dimensions of recent Partition Studies focusing on the trajectory or aftermath of Bengal Partition as specific level of study.
- 12. The expenditure for organizing the workshops/Seminars will be incurred by the host institution with a modest budget and moderate arrangements. Experts/officials invited at the workshop will be covered by standard accommodation, hospitality, local conveyance etc. but Travelling allowance or Airfare may not be covered under project expenses. The TA or round trip fare for invited experts of either host institution will be the responsibility of their own.
- 13. Intimation to the respective High-Commissions about the workshop/seminar, and procuring necessary help thereof will be the responsibility of the host institution.

### ARTICLE 7: USE OF WEBSITE

- 14. The project findings and other details will be uploaded in the website of CLTCS, Netaji Subhas Open University as it already installed and exists with regular maintenance. The CLTCS weblink will be redirected to BOU site as project updates.
- 15. The host Institutions shall hold their rights to upload academic matters relating to broad areas of the research project in particular, and make available their planning regarding the project for greater publicity in good sprit. Such uploads shall however, not divulge any findings of the field study.
- 16. The matter recorded under this project, either in Audio or in Video format shall be uploaded in website with mutual consent. No such matter that can in any way run contrary to the spirit of national or local interest shall be uploaded in any case.
- 17. Cost of maintenance and other IT related technicalities will not come under the purview of such MOU.

Otherwise, the final report may be offered to a reputed private Publisher for publication in monograph format. The modus operandi will be worked out by mutual consent.

#### **ARTICLE 9: FUNDING**

19. This collaborative research funding will be guided by the existing finance rule of the either part and case to case approval from the concerned competent authority as applicable therein. Neither party is obligated to expend any monies or other resources in connection with this MOU. As for the external funds required by either party, no matter for what kind of purpose, appropriate or not, neither party will have financial obligation to the other party upon such determination.

## ARTICLE 10: MUTUAL COMMITMENT FOR HOLDING FOLLOWING EVENTS

20. Two universities have agreed to jointly organize events concerning the research collaboration as per the following schedule:

#### 1. SCOPE OF SERVICES:

- a) The NSOU-CLTCS in association with 'Serampore Girls College' will conduct the following Short-term Training Programme:

- NSOU-CLTCS & Serampore Girls College shall plan and prepare the syllabus and determine the mode of delivery
- d) Certificate to be issued to the successful trainees with grade under joint signatories of authorized officer of NSOU and Serampore Girls College.

# 2. THE FOLLOWING ARE THE RESPONSIBILITIES OF NSOU AND SERAMPORE GIRLS COLLEGE

## 2.1 RESPONSIBILITIES OF NSOU-CLTCS:

- a) Preparation & printing of common prospectus (to be sold at price fixed by NSOU-CLTCS and the sale proceeds shall be deposited to NSOU-CLTCS Account by Serampore Girls College)
- b) Constitution of Course Advisory Committee (CAC)
- c) Holding of TAC meeting at the University Headquarters
- d) Supervising the academic part of the training programme
- e) Issue of Unique Identification Number (UIN) to each trainee

## 2.2 RESPONSIBILITIES OF SERAMPORE GIRLS COLLEGE

- a) Serampore Girls College shall conduct the programme as per the norms and guidelines set by TAC. It will also bear the responsibilities of a study centre of the NSOU.
- Serampore Girls College shall provide the infrastructure including the premises, furniture, teaching aids classroom and workshop etc.
- c) Serampore Girls College shall collect the programme fees (including prospectus fees as applicable) from the trainees as approved by the CLTCS, NSOU
- d) Serampore Girls College shall provide the trainers/ faculties as approved by the TAC
- e) Serampore Girls College shall conduct the assessment as framed by the TAC under the supervision of CLTCS, NSOU
- f) Serampore Girls College shall make necessary advertisement for admission with prior approval of CLTCS, NSOU
- g) Serampore Girls College shall publish the counselling schedule of theory and practical sessions on their website and also send a copy of the schedule to the CLTCS, NSOU.
- h) Serampore Girls College shall allow the University team to visit the centre any time and to inspect all relevant documents

#### 3. REVENUE SHARING

The trainees need to pay the cost of Prospectus and the Programme fees at the time of admission. The Serampore Girls College shall remit the share of

revenue as agreed to NSOU after admission and before the commencement of the course, either through bank Demand Draft or fund transfer to the designated bank account "NSOU-CLTCS" A/c. Assessment fees may be collected by the Serampore Girls College with prior approval of the CLTCS, NSOU. No other fees to be collected from the trainees by the Serampore Girls College. The revenue sharing ratio may be revised depending on the number of students from time to time mutually.

## 4. VALIDITY

This Memorandum of Understanding shall remain valid for a period of two years from the date of signing of the MoU unless it is terminated as par Para 8(c). The same may be extended and modified on mutually agreed written terms and conditions.

### 5. ASSESSMENT PROCEDURE

At the end the training programmes the Serampore Girls college will conduct the assessment of the students. The assessment would comprise class interaction, class participation, continuous assessment, performance in workshop and hands-on-training and also include viva voce etc as per guidelines framed by CAC. On the basis of the performance, the Certificate will be issued with grade under joint signatories as specified in Para 1(d).

### 6. CERTIFICATE WITH GRADATION

At the end of the duration, a completion certificate will be issued to the participants jointly signed by the Director/ Officer-in-Charge of the School/ Coordinator of CLTCS, NSOU and the Joint Director of the Serampore Girls College with the following grade.

A+ 90% and above

A 80% to 89%

B+ 70% to 79%

B 60% to 69%

C below 60%

### 7. FORCE MAJEURE

a) In the event either party cannot perform its respective obligation under the Memorandum due to Force Majeure, the corresponding obligations of the other party may at the instance and notice of such either party be suspended for a similar period of time.

Force Majeure shall include but limited to regulations of Government, earthquakes, floods, epidemic, war, revolution, strikes, lockouts, explosion, computer virus attack and natural calamities.

#### 8. SPECIAL CLAUSE

NSOU shall control/monitor the functioning of the joint venture. The committee would, as and when necessary, will suggest to alter/modify and review the existing MOU for effective implementation of the course. - b) On all aspects where the above articles of understanding are silent or for special cases of deviation from these articles, the decision mutually agreed upon in writing between the parties will be final. 
SCC awareness Camp at AC College Study Centre on 19/12/2021






SCC awareness Camp at Durgapur Govt. College Study Centre on 19/12/2021












Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor in his introductory remarks, greeted the esteemed members present and explained the importance behind convening the meeting.

#### Agenda and proceedings of the meeting are as follows:

Agenda 1. To report previous year's (Academic Year 2021-22) admission status. [Annexure-I: Admission Report]

Reported and Confirmed.

Agenda 2. To consider implementation of CBCS system for B.A. in Public Administration from Academic Year 2022-23. [Annexure-II: Course Structure of B.A. in Public Administration].



Reported by Director, School of Social Sciences and after discussion, the House has approved to implement CBCS system for B.A. in Public Administration from Academic Year 2022-23 and accordingly advise Registrar Department to take necessary initiatives for incorporation of required changes in existing admission system of the University.

Agenda 3. To consider fixation of intake capacity for Under Graduate lab based science programme in ODL mode maintaining guideline of UGC (Open and Distance Learning Programmes and Online Programmes) Regulations, 2020: it shall be commensurate with the capacity of the LSCs to provide lab facilities to the admitted learners from the Academic Year 2022-23.

After threadbare discussion on the issue in light of previous year admission report and existing policy of the University [based on the aforesaid UGC (Open and Distance Learning Programmes and Online Programmes) Regulations, 2020] to conduct Lab sessions (LCES) for lab based science subjects, the House has come up with the following observations:

- a. School of Science organises Lab sessions (LCES) for lab based science subjects, during which the School carefully allots leaners to selected centres where lab sessions are conducted. It is observed by the House, that the modalities to conduct LCES has been at per with the prescribed norms of UGC (Open and Distance Learning Programmes and Online Programmes) Regulations, 2020.
- b. From the enrolment figures for lab based science subjects it is also observed that enrolment ratio is commensurate till date with the UGC (Open and Distance Learning Programmes and Online Programmes) Regulations, 2020.

However, to ensure satisfactory participation of the LSCs the House has recommended to incorporate the following clauses in the MoU between the University and LSCs:

- LSCs will have to conduct lab based activities/ field work/ dissertation/ hands on training for enrolled learners of the University as and when instructed by the University.
- All teachers (including SACT-I) of LSCs have to participate in any academic activities as and when instructed by the University.
- LSCs have to provide necessary physical infrastructure/ support service/ human resources at their disposal for conduction of Term End Examinations and Assessment of Assignments of the University as and when instructed by the University.

Subject: Scope of introducing B. Ed. - ODL Programme at School of Education, NSOU as per NCTE Gazette Notification No. 509, date, 22.10.2021

"The National Council for Teacher Education (Recognitions, Norms and Procedure) Amendment Regulations, 2021" came into force with the official Gazette Notification (No. 509) on October 22, 2021. In this context, the present status of SoE, NSOU has been reviewed and identified some points on which decisions may be taken for introducing B. Ed. ODL programme as a part of future planning and development of the SoE, NSOU:

- 'Norms and Standards' of 15 types of Teacher Education institutions offering the
  identified 15 Teacher Education programmes including B.Ed. have been specified and the
  concerned Notification of B.Ed. ODL, Appendix 10 seems to be suitable for SOE,
  NSOU having the previous experience of organizing B.Ed. Programme assigned by the
  State Govt. especially to address the crisis of qualified in-service teachers throughout the
  State and that has been successfully completed.
- 2. As per the eligibility norms (Sec. 2.1) of institution for conducting B.Ed. ODL Programme either through integrated or stand-alone form, the SoE, NSOU seems to be eligible as a State Open University.
- 3. As per Sec 6.1 of the Notification, the curriculum and faculty norms of the B. Ed. Programme offered through the face-to-face mode and the ODL mode will be the same.
- 4. Thus, the Staff pattern for conducting B.Ed. ODL programme, vide Sec, 7.1 (i), shall have exclusive core full-time faculty of seven members with expertise in relevant disciplines like Education, Sciences, Mathematics, Social Sciences and Languages.
- 5. The break up of the Faculty as required to organise the B.Ed. programme would be will be Professor (one), Associated Professor (two) and Assistant Professor (four).
- 6. In this context, the existing total full-time faculty strength to conduct the B.Ed. ODL programme at SoE is five (5) with the following break up:

Professor: Three (Contractual Superannuated),

Associated Professor: Nil,

Assistant Professor: Two (Substantive).

7. Hence, according to the new Norms notified, at least two full-time faculty posts (lying vacant) need to be immediately recruited (preferably in any two subjects from English, Bengali, History, and Mathematics) for one unit of intake (500 learners as per NCTE norms) for the B.Ed. - ODL Programme.

[4.1 Intake: The basic unit of intake of the B. Ed. Programme shall not exceed 500 students subject to the condition that one Study Centre shall enrol not more than 50 students in a given session.]

This note sheet was submitted to the former Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor for his kind appraisal and necessary direction on 09. 02. 2022 and he put some remarks on it (copy enclosed).

Previously, we submitted an application to the NCTE on 21. 05.2015 for permission to start B. Ed. - ODL in the prescribed format. We also obtained the consent from 10 study centres to conduct the B. Ed. - ODL programme. The inspection of Headquarters of our university along with the Regional Centre, Kalyani was duly conducted by the NCTE in the month of August 2015, but our prayer was not considered in the ground of shortage of substantive faculties.

Associated Professor: one Contractual (age of superannuation and other benefits shall be as the policy of the State governments/ Affiliating bodies 7.5),

Respected Madam/Sir,

As you are aware, the Commission with the concurrence of Ministry of Education had notified "The University Grants Commission (Establishment and Operation of Academic Bank of Credits in Higher Education) Regulations. 2021" in the Gazette of India on 28th July, 2021. The Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) platform has been developed by the National e-Governance Division (NeGD) of Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY) under DigiLocker framework, with facility/functionality of opening Academic Account by the students and on-boarding of Higher Educational Institutions (HEIs).

Academic Bank of Credits will digitally store the academic credits earned by students from HEIs registered with ABC, for awarding degree/Diploma /Certificates taking into account credits earned by students. ABC will ensure the opening, closure, and validation of Academic Bank of Accounts, verification, accumulation, and transfer or redemption for students. ABC facilitate students to choose their own learning path to attain a degree /Diploma /Certificates, working on the principle of multiple entry-multiple exit as well as any-time, any-where, and any-level learning.

To enhance the reach of the ABC programme, all Higher Educational Institutions are requested to take action on the following on urgent basis:

- Register your Institution on ABC (www.abc.gov.in).
- Upload data of Student Credits obtained during or after the academic year 2021-22.
- Make the students of your Institution aware about ABC facility and encourage and hand-hold them for opening Academic Bank Account on ABC portal (www.abc.gov.in).
- Create a hyperlink of ABC URL, i.e., www.abc gov in on your Institution's respective website's home page.
- Depute the Nodal Officers for implementing ABC and reflecting their details on their websites.
- Higher Educational Institutions may insist their students to fill up ABC id on all examination form.

# UNIVERSITY GRANTS COMMISSION NOTIFICATION

New Delhi, the 28th July, 2021

- F. No. 14-31/2018 (CPP-II).—In exercise of the powers conferred by clauses (f) and (g) of sub-Section (1) of Section 26 of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956, the University Grants Commission with the approval of the Central Government hereby makes the following regulations, namely:-
- Short title, Application and Commencement.- (1) These Regulations may be called the University Grants Commission (Establishment and Operation of Academic Bank Of Credits in Higher Education) Regulations, 2021.
  - (2) These Regulations shall apply to all Universities in India established or incorporated by or under a Central Act, a Provincial Act or a State Act; the institutions Deemed-to be Universities declared as such under Section 3 of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956 (3 of 1956); and the Autonomous Colleges as defined in these regulations.
  - (3) They shall come into force from the date of their notification in the Gazette of India.
- 2. Definitions.- In these Regulations, unless the context otherwise requires,-
  - (a) "Act" means the University Grants Commission Act, 1956 (3 of 1956);

- (b) "Academic Bank Account" means an individual account with the Academic Bank of Credits opened and operated by a student, to which all academic credits earned by the Student from course(s) of study are deposited, recognised, maintained, accumulated, transferred, validated or redeemed for the purposes of the award of degree/diploma/certificates etc. by an awarding institution;
- (c) "Academic Bank of Credits" means an academic service mechanism as a digital or virtual or online entity established by the Commission with the approval of the Central Government, to facilitate students to become its academic account holders, thereby paving the way for seamless student mobility between or within degree-granting Higher Educational Institutions through a formal system of credit recognition, credit accumulation, credit transfers and credit redemption to promote distributed and flexible teaching-learning;
- (d) "Academic Flexibility" means the provision for innovative and interchangeable curricular structures to enable creative combinations of Courses or Programmes in Disciplines of study leading to Degree or Diploma or Post Graduate Diploma or Certificate of Study offering multiple entry and multiple exit facilities, while removing rigid curricular boundaries and creating new possibilities of life-long learning;
- (d) "Autonomous college" means any institution, whether known as such or by any other name, accorded with autonomous status by the Commission upon the recommendations of the affiliating university and the State Government concerned, by virtue of which it provides for a course or programme of study with academic and innovative flexibility for obtaining any qualification from a university; and which, in accordance with the Statutes and Ordinances of such university, is recognised as competent to provide for such course or programme of study and present students undergoing such course or programme of study for the examination leading to the award of such qualification;
- (f) "Commission" shall have the same meaning as assigned to it in clause (a) of section 2 of the Act;
- (g) "Course" means one of the specified units which go to comprise a specified programme of study;
- (h) "Credit" means the standard methodology of calculating one hour of theory or one hour of tutorial or two hours of laboratory work, per week for a duration of a semester (13-15 weeks) resulting in the award of one credit; which is awarded by a higher educational institution on which these regulations apply; and, Credits' for internship shall be one credit per one week of internship, subject to a maximum of six credits;
- "Credit-accumulation" means the facility created by Academic Bank of Credits in the Academic Bank Account opened by students in order to transfer and consolidate the credits earned by them by undergoing Courses;
- (j) "Credits-recognition" means the credits earned through a registered Higher Educational Institution and transferred directly to the Academic Bank of Credits by such Higher Educational Institution,
- (k) "Credit-redemption" means the process of commuting the accrued credits in the Academic Bank Account of the students maintained in ABC for the purpose of fulfilling the credits requirements for the award of Degrees or Diplomas or Certificates or Course work for Ph.D. programme etc., by the registered degree-awarding Higher Educational Institutions;
- (l) "Credit-transfer" means the mechanism by which the Registered Higher Educational Institutions are able to receive or provide prescribed credits to individual Academic Bank Accounts in

- adherence to the University Grants Commission credit norms for the 'course/s' undertaken by students enrolled in any Registered Higher Education Institution within India;
- (m) "Higher Education Institutions" means the institutions which are empowered to award degrees by themselves or in accordance with section 22 of the Act;
- (n) "Professional Standards Setting Body" means a regulatory or principal body created, established or constituted under an Act of Parliament for determining and maintaining standards in the relevant areas of higher education;
- (o) "Programme" or "Programme of study" means a higher education programme pursued for a degree specified by the Commission under sub-section (3) of section 22 of the Act;
- (p) "Registered Higher Education Institution" means an eligible Higher Educational Institution which is registered by the Academic Bank of Credits, under these regulations;
- (q) "Statutory authority" means statutory bodies of higher educational institutions, such as the Governing Council or Executive Council or Syndicate or Board of Management or Academic Council, competent to take decisions on behalf of the institution.
- (r) "Student" means a person admitted to, and pursuing, a specified credit-based course/programme of study in a higher education institution.
- 3. Academic Bank of Credits.- (1) Academic Bank of Credits, shall be a national-level facility to promote flexibility of curriculum framework and interdisciplinary or multidisciplinary academic mobility of students across Higher Education Institutions in the country with appropriate credit transfer mechanism created through these regulations and shall facilitate students to choose their own learning path to attain a Degree or Diploma or Post Graduate diploma or academic qualification, working on the principle of multiple entry-multiple exit as well as any-time, any-where, and any-level learning.
- (2) Academic Bank of Credits shall enable the integration of multiple disciplines of higher learning, leading to the desired learning outcomes including enhanced creativity, innovation, higher order thinking and critical analysis.
- (3) Academic Bank of Credits shall provide significant autonomy to students by providing extensive choice of courses for a programme of study, flexibility in curriculum, novel and engaging course options across a number of higher education disciplines or institutions.
- 4. Objectives of Academic Bank of Credits.-(1)To promote student centricity with learner-friendly approaches in higher education across the country and promote a more inter-disciplinary approach in higher education.
- (2) To enable students to select the best courses or combination of courses to suit their aptitude and quest for knowledge.
- (3) To permit students to choose a pace for their studies along with the associated logistics and costs.
- (4) To allow students to tailor their degrees or make specific modifications or specialisations rather than undergoing the rigid, regularly prescribed degree or courses of a single university or autonomous college.
- (5) To enable multiple entry-multiple exit for students to complete their degrees as per their time preferences, providing mobility across various disciplines and HEIs for Degree or Diploma or Post Graduate Diploma or Certificate programme or Course work for the Ph.D. programme.
- (6) To support, procedurally, the teaching-learning activities to happen in a distributed and blended manner through integration across campuses or universities or autonomous colleges with increased mobility.

- (7) To facilitate lifelong learning amongst all, i.e., formal and informal students from both full-time and part-time modes.
- (8) To satisfy the students' quest for knowledge, freedom to choose and change their academic directions, connect different domains of knowledge and help them acquire the right foundations and building blocks to pursue their life goals.
- 5. Organisational Structure of Academic Bank of Credits.- (1)Academic Bank of Credits shall be a digital or virtual or online store-house entity of academic credit data base of Higher Education Institution with students as its stakeholder.
- (2) Academic Bank of Credits shall be established, on the lines of the National Academic Depository shall have a dynamic website providing all details of Academic Bank of Credits and its operational mechanism for the use of all stakeholder of higher education.
- Academic Bank of Credits shall be a bank for academic purposes, on the pattern of commercial banks for financial purposes, with students as academic account holders to whom, the Academic Bank of Credits shall provide a variety of services including credit verification, credit accumulation, credit transfer or redemption and authentication of academic awards.
- (4) Authentication of credits or academic awards by Academic Bank of Credits shall not, in any way, be construed as encroachment on the statutory powers of Higher Education Institutions registered with Academic Bank of Credits to award degrees and other academic qualifications.
- (5) ABC shall act as the body empowered by the Central Government or the Commission, as the case may be, to provide authenticated records of credits earned by students from Registered Higher Education Institutions.
- (6) The requirement of credits as well as essential components of study for award of any Under Graduate or Post Graduate or diploma or certificate, or the Course work requirements for the Ph.D. programmes shall be as prescribed by Registered HEIs.
- (7) Academic Bank of Credits shall provide to every student the facility to open unique or individual Academic Bank Account in digital form; and the account holder shall be provided with a unique ID and access to the Standard Operating Procedure (SOP).
- 6. Functions of Academic Bank of Credits. -(1) Academic Bank of Credits shall deposit Credits awarded by Registered Higher Education Institutions, for Courses pursued therein, in the Academic Bank Account of the student and the validity of such credits shall be as per norms and guidelines issued by the Commission from time to time:

Provided that ABC shall not accept any document pertaining to course credits directly from students and shall entertain such documents as valid only when the same are transmitted by the respective, Registered Higher Education Institution awarding the credits.

- (2) ABC shall register Higher Education Institutions under these regulations, ensure the opening, closure and validation of Academic Bank Accounts and shall also ensure credit verification, credit accumulation, and credit transfer or redemption for students; apart from promoting its role among stakeholder.
- (3) Courses undergone by the students through the online modes through National Schemes like SWAYAM, NPTEL, V-Lab etc. or of any specified university, shall also be considered for credit transfer and credit accumulation.
- (4) The functions of ABC are not limited to distance or a non-contact mode; and shall extend to amalgamation of various existing and futuristic teaching-learning models and it may also consider

- credits obtained by students in assessments for theory or practicals, if the same are offered as separate credit courses.
- (5) The norms in respect to the curriculum content, curriculum transaction, educational technologies for the courses offered, their timing, continuous evaluation methods, attendance and novel methods of assessment shall be as decided by the Registered Higher Education Institution, and shall be consistent with the overarching policy and philosophy of holistic, multidisciplinary education under National Education Policy-2020.
- (6) In the interests of students, credits earned and deposited with ABC shall be valid for the purpose of redemption to a degree or diploma or Post Graduate diploma or certificate, for varying duration as specified by the credit awarding and credit accepting Higher Education Institution subject to a maximum duration of seven years.
- (7) Academic Bank of Credits shall encompass all higher education programmes coming under the purview of the Commission, the All India Council of Technical Education, and the National Council of Teacher Education; credits in professional programmes of study in respect of other disciplines may be included with the approval of the appropriate professional standards setting body and the Central Government.
- (8) Academic Bank of Credits shall also facilitate the credit recognition and credit redemption process for students who may opt, according to their individual choice, for all courses, not falling in any particular subject domain, but fulfilling the total credits requirement for the Under Graduate degree to be awarded by a Registered Higher Education Institution and such Under Graduate degree to be awarded by the Higher Education Institution may be specified by the Commission.
- (9) In addition to the choice based courses to be undertaken by the student as a part of the specific higher education programme in Registered Higher Education Institutions, students shall also have freedom to take additional courses of their aptitude, beyond the curriculum prescribed for such degree programme, and accrue credits in their respective Academic Bank Account:
  - Provided that Registered Higher Education Institutions may award diploma or certificate against credits accrued in respect of courses undertaken by students beyond the prescribed curriculum.
- (10) Credits obtained by students by undergoing Skill-courses from Registered Higher Education Institutions offering vocational Degree or Diploma or Post Graduate Diploma or Certificate programmes are also eligible for accrual and redemption of credits through the Academic Bank of Credits.
- (11) Credits obtained by undertaking Courses in Registered HEIs during or after the academic year 2021-2022 alone are eligible for Credit transfer, Credit accrual and Credit redemption through Academic Bank of Credits.
- (12) For carrying out the purposes of the Academic Bank of Credits, the Commission may provide such financial and administrative assistance to the Academic Bank of Credits, as it may deem fit.
- 7. Eligibility Criteria for approval of HEIs to register with Academic Bank of Credits.-(1)

  Universities and Autonomous Colleges satisfying sub-regulation (2) of regulation 1, which are accredited by either National Assessment and Accreditation Council with minimum 'A' Grade or by National Board of Accreditation for at least three programme(s) with a minimum score of 675 individually (however, if the number of programme(s) being run by the Institution is less than three, then each of the programmes should secure 675 or more marks); or top 100 National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) or similar Assessment and Accreditation body(ies) to be established by Government of India from time to time or those Indian Higher Education Institutions appearing in top 1000 world ranking of Quacquarelli Symonds (QS)/ Times Higher

- Education (THE); Institutions of Eminence or Institutions of National Importance as declared by Government of India are eligible to register with Academic Bank of Credits.
- (2) Accreditation or ranking status must be valid at the time of registration with Academic Bank of Credits.
- (3) HEIs shall obtain approval from their respective statutory authorities such as the Governing or Executive Council or Syndicate or Board of Management or Academic Council etc., to apply for registration with Academic Bank of Credits.
- (4) Registered Higher Education Institutions shall be required to admit students to individual courses, in addition to their admissions to full degree programmes:
  - Provided that in order to avoid overcrowding in a course(s) of any Higher Education Institution, such Higher Education Institution shall be permitted to have additional (supernumerary) seats in such course(s), subject to prior approval by the appropriate professional standards setting body:
  - Provided further that in respect of courses, not coming under the purview of any professional standards setting body the Registered Higher Education Institution may, subject to availability of required infrastructure, create supernumerary seats with the approval of its statutory authorities:
  - Provided also that, Registered Higher Education Institution may also offer a set of Courses, exclusively for the purpose of the Academic Bank of Credits Scheme.
  - (5) Registered Higher Education Institution shall have the appropriate educational infrastructure in terms of audio-visual facilities, e-resources, Virtual classrooms and studios etc., and specifically high bandwidth internet connectivity to support ODL or On-line courses or programmes and other infrastructural facilities for face to face theory or practical/ or training courses as specified, from time to time, under the relevant University Grants Commission Regulations and/or Statutes or Ordinances of the Higher Education Institution.
  - (6) A Registered Higher Education Institution shall have a webpage on its website containing details of the facility of Academic Bank of Credits, list of all Registered Higher Education Institutions, guidelines or Standard Operating Procedures for the students to utilise the facility effectively, along with a link to the website of Academic Bank of Credits.
  - 8. Academic Bank of Credits Implementation methodology. (1)Academic Bank of Credits is essentially a credit-based, and highly flexible, student-centric facility.
    - (2) Registered Higher Education Institutions shall, with the approval of their statutory authorities, amend the extant Ordinances relating to, inter alia, Course registration, Course requirements, acceptance for inter-disciplinary and multi-disciplinary courses, Credits to be offered to such courses, Credit transfers and Credits acceptance from other approved Higher Education Institutions, nature of grades to be awarded etc.
    - (3) Registered Higher Education Institutions shall encourage and enable students to customise or design their own degrees utilising Courses selected by the student from among courses offered by one or more of the Registered Higher Education Institutions:
      - Provided that, the student shall be required to earn at least fifty per cent of the credits from the Higher Education Institution awarding the degree or diploma or certificate:
      - Provided further that, the student shall be required to earn the required number of credits in the core subject area necessary for the award of the degree or Diploma or Certificate, as specified by the degree awarding Higher Education Institution, in which the student is enrolled.

- (4) Students availing flexibility under the facility of ABC provided in sub-regulation (3) are entitled to subscribe only to Courses of their choice and aptitude, so as to enable them to accumulate credits and not to the entire Programme of study leading to the award of a degree by the Registered Higher Education Institution.
- (5) The ABC shall maintain a dynamic online directory of Higher Education Institutions which satisfy the eligibility criteria stipulated under regulation 7.
- (6) Every Registered Higher Education Institution shall provide student counselling and guidance to all students desirous of opening an Academic Bank Account with Academic Bank of Credits, in regard to the details of utilisation of the services of Academic Bank of Credits in terms of Credit definition, Credit accumulation, Credit transfer, Credit redemption as well as in respect of the opening, closure and validation of Academic Bank Accounts of students where such requests are recommended through the parent University or Autonomous colleges which are already registered with Academic Bank of Credits.
- (7) Credits earned by students shall be deposited in the respective Academic Bank Account with ABC and shall be valid for not exceeding seven years as specified by the credit awarding institutions and subject to its acceptance by the Registered Higher Education Institution awarding academic qualifications, for the purpose of commutation of credits for the award of any Degree or Diploma or Certificate:
  - Provided that once any credit is redeemed for the award of the aforementioned academic qualification, such credit shall be irrevocably debited from the respective student's Academic Bank Account.
- (8) Where a student fulfils the norms of sufficiency of total number of credits and of the nature of credits, approved by a Registered Higher Education Institution for the award of the specified Degree or Diploma or Post Graduate Diploma or Certificate, the student shall be eligible for such award by that Higher Education Institution.
- (9) Once used, or redeemed, Credits earned by a student cannot be re-used for the award of any other formal academic qualifications.
- (10) With the approval of its statutory authorities, a Registered Higher Education Institution shall be encouraged by Academic Bank of Credits to apportion the structure of courses offered by it as core courses or core electives or open electives or skill enhancement electives or ability enhancement electives etc. with appropriate credit requirements, in order to promote multi-disciplinary or inter-disciplinary higher education.
- (11) In awarding academic qualifications etc., Registered Higher Education Institutions shall follow the norms and guidelines, in regard to the number of credits and duration of time, stipulated from time to time by the Commission or the professional standards setting body, as the case may be:
  - Provided that in respect of time duration, a student pursuing academic qualifications under the Academic Bank of Credits facility may, after earning the stipulated credits, avail a relaxation of a maximum of one semester, provided the duration of the course or programme is of two-years or more (Four semesters or more).
- (12) A Registered Higher Education Institution may fix its Course fee based on the number of credits of a course for which the student is enrolled.
- (13) The Higher Education Institution shall pay a fee for registration as an eligible institution under these regulations, which shall be determined with the prior approval of the Central Government or the Commission, as the case may be.

- 9. Monitoring, support and Quality assurance by Universities and ABC.- (1) It shall be the responsibility of Registered Higher Education Institutions, to monitor the development and operationalisation of the Academic Bank of Credits programme at the university level and at the level of their affiliated autonomous colleges.
- (2) Registered Higher Education Institutions shall offer teacher or staff training, mentoring, academic and administrative audit and other measures for improving the quality of performance of the Academic Bank of Credits facility and promotion of holistic/multidisciplinary education with the support of Academic Bank of Credits, which may be in the form of Faculty Development Programmes or Quality Improvement Programmes or Professional Development Programmes or Technology Inculcation Programmes.
- (3) The Quality assurance of the implementation of Academic Bank of Credits at the level of the registered university or autonomous college shall be developed by the University or autonomous college concerned either through the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) or any other appropriate structured mechanism as may be decided by the Registered Higher Education Institution.
- (4) Every Registered Higher Education shall upload, annually, on its website, a report of its activities vis a vis the Academic Bank of Credits, as well as of measures taken by it for Quality assurance, Quality sustenance and Quality enhancement.
- (5) There shall be an Academic Bank of Credits-Grievance Redressal Mechanism at the level of Central Government/University Grants Commission/Academic Bank of Credits, and at the level of every Higher Education Institution registered with Academic Bank of Credits to address the grievance/appeals of students.
- 10. Consequences of violation. Where a Registered Higher Education Institution fails to fulfil the conditions or requirements prescribed under these regulations, the Commission may, after providing a reasonable opportunity of being heard, direct the institution to rectify the deficiency within such period of time as may be stipulated by the Commission and on failure on the part of the Higher Education Institution to do so, terminate the registration of such institution from Academic Bank of Credits and, in addition, cease to provide grants under the Act, where such grants are admissible to the institution.
  - 11. Interpretation.- Any question as to the interpretation of these Regulations shall be decided by the Commission, and its decision shall be final and binding in the matter.

## Guidelines for Pursuing Two Academic Programmes Simultaneously

### Background

The National Education Policy - NEP 2020 states that pedagogy must evolve to make education more experiential, holistic, integrated, inquiry-driven, discovery-oriented, learner-centred, discussion-based, flexible, and, of course, enjoyable. The policy envisions imaginative and flexible curricular structures to enable creative combinations of disciplines for study, that would offer multiple entry and exit points, thus, removing currently prevalent rigid boundaries and creating new possibilities for life-long learning and centrally involve critical and interdisciplinary thinking.

With the rapid increase in demand for higher education and limited availability of seats in regular stream, several Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) have started a number of programmes in Open and Distance Learning (ODL) mode to meet the aspirations of students. It has also led to the emergence of online education programmes which a student can pursue within the comforts of her / his home. The issue of allowing the students to pursue two academic programmes simultaneously has been examined by the Commission keeping in view the proposals envisaged in the National Education Policy - NEP 2020 which emphasizes the need to facilitate multiple pathways to learning involving both formal and non-formal education modes.

In view of above, UGC has framed the following Guidelines.

## **Objectives**

To allow the students to pursue two academic programmes simultaneously keeping in view the following objectives envisaged in NEP 2020:

- recognizing, identifying, and fostering the unique capabilities of each student, by sensitizing teachers as well as parents to promote each student's holistic development in both academic and non-academic spheres;
- no hard separations between arts and sciences, between curricular and extracurricular activities, between vocational and academic streams, etc. in order to eliminate harmful hierarchies among, and silos between different areas of learning;

- multidisciplinarity and a holistic education across the sciences, social sciences, arts, humanities, and sports for a multidisciplinary world in order to ensure the unity and integrity of all knowledge;
- enabling an individual to study one or more specialized areas of interest at a deep level, and also develop character, ethical and constitutional values, intellectual curiosity, scientific temper, creativity, spirit of service.
- offering the students, a range of disciplines including sciences, social sciences, arts, humanities, languages, as well as professional, technical, and vocational subjects to make them thoughtful, well-rounded, and creative individuals.
- preparing students for more meaningful and satisfying lives and work roles and enable economic independence.

## Guidelines

- A student can pursue two full time academic programmes in physical mode provided that in such cases, class timings for one programme do not overlap with the class timings of the other programme.
- A student can pursue two academic programmes, one in full time physical mode and another
  in Open and Distance Learning (ODL)/Online mode; or up to two ODL/Online programmes
  simultaneously.
- Degree or diploma programmes under ODL/Online mode shall be pursued with only such HEIs which are recognized by UGC/Statutory Council/Govt. of India for running such programmes.
- Degree or diploma programmes under these guidelines shall be governed by the Regulations notified by the UGC and also the respective statutory/professional councils, wherever applicable.
- 5. These guidelines shall come into effect from the date of their notification by the UGC. No retrospective benefit can be claimed by the students who have already done two academic programmes simultaneously prior to the notification of these guidelines.

The above guidelines shall be applicable only to the students pursuing academic programmes other than Ph.D. programme.

Based on the above guidelines, the universities can devise mechanisms, through their statutory bodies, for allowing their students to pursue two academic programmes simultaneously as mentioned above.

Officer-in-charge, Centre for Online Education welcomed all the participants and initiated the discussions.

He mentioned that this meeting has become imperative following an advisory from the Secretary, UGC [D.O.F.No.1-812017 (SWAYAM) 3rd June, 2022] with "Request to adopt University Grants Commission (Credit Framework for Online Learning Courses through Study Webs of Active Learning for Young Aspiring Minds) Regulations, 2021". UGC has also shared a survey report on the status of credit transfer for non-technical courses for July 2021 Semester. It reveals that 72 students enrolled with 13 state/private universities/HEIs in West Bengal have sought credit transfer on the basis of credits earned through SWAYAM. But most important is the fact that amongst these 72 students, there is one NSOU student who has sought credit transfer.

The Hon'ble Vice Chancellor suggested that it was high time an SOP for integration of SWAYAM-MOOCs at NSOU was framed to address not only the above matters but also to implement the provisions of the University Grants Commission (Open and Distance Learning Programmes and Online Programmes) Regulations, 2020 along with NEP 2020 Guidelines in letter and spirit.

After threadbare discussion, the following were resolved:

- SWAYAM-MOOCs Courses/Credits should be accepted for GE across all the Schools, subject to mapping of Course Content and Engagement Hours.
- SWAYAM-MOOCs Courses/Credits should be accepted for AECC-1 [Bengali/English] across all the Schools.
- SWAYAM-MOOCs Courses/Credits should be accepted for AECC-2 [ENVS] across all the Schools.
- Acceptance of SWAYAM-MOOCs Courses/Credits for SEC, DSE & CC should depend upon the respective Schools.
- 5. SOP for Credit Transfer mechanism—(a) application for inbound Credit Transfer to be submitted to the Controller of Examinations; (b) these applications to be routed to appropriate Schools; (c) Credit Equivalence/Weightage to be proposed by the appropriate department in consultation with the Board of Studies under the aegis of respective Schools.

## A Draft Note on Equivalence and Conversion of SWAYAM MOOCs for NSOU

The following is suggested considering a 4-credit SWAYAM MOOC which tallies with NSOU syllabus:

#### A. Equivalence

A 4-credit SWAYAM MOOC carries total marks of 100 [30 for Assignments & 70 for Proctored Examination] => Mark Load per Credit for SWAYAM MOOC is 25 [110/4].(A)

NSOU prescribes 70 marks [20 for Assignments & 50 for TE Exam.] for a 6-credit course => Mark Load per Credit for NSOU is 11.67 [70/6]. (B)

Comparing (A) & (B), we can say that the Load Value of SWAYAM MOOC is 2.4 times [(A)/(B)] the Load Value of NSOU course, which is compatible in terms of CBCS content => SWAYAM MOOC has a Load Quotient of 2.14 per credit compared with NSOU. (C)

Hence a 4-credit SWAYAM MOOC may be treated as EQUIVALENT to 8.56 credit score at NSOU [4 x 2.14 = 8.56].

The above IMPLIES, a student who successfully completes a 4-credit SWAYAM MOOC may be awarded 8.56 credit score for his/her effort. But, since NSOU awards only 6 credits at the maximum, the student may be awarded 6 credits, which will be shown in the Marks-sheet.

#### B. Conversion of Marks

SWAYAM MOOC marks have TWO distinct components adding up to Full Mark [30 for Assignments + 70 for Proctored Examination = 100].

To convert SWAYAM marks NSOU has to scale down, multiplying marks of all the THREE components by 0.7.

Marks for each component to be restricted to the maximum in each component prescribed at NSOU, i.e. 20 for Assignments and 50 for TE Examinations. Any mark being excess in one component to be distributed to the other component, so that the total marks and percentage remain unaffected.

#### **EXAMPLE**

A student completes a 4-credit SWAYAM MOOC with 72%, scoring 30/30 for In-course Assignments and 42/70 in Proctored Examination.

NSOU conversion may be as follows-

 $30 \times 0.7 = 21$ ,  $42 \times 0.7 = 29.4$ ,  $72 \times 0.7 = 50.4$ 

Maximum marks for Assignments at NSOU are 20. So, NSOU will award only 20 for the student's Assignment, award 30.4 [29.4+1], rounded off to 30, for his/her TE Exam. His/her Total marks will be 50, rounding off 50.4.

The student's Marks-sheet will show the above marks.

# Memorandum of Understanding for opening Learner Support Centre / Study Centre for Post-Graduate ( Non-lab) Programmes of Netaji Subhas Open University

In terms of Netaji Subhas Open University First Statutes (Revised), 2014 No. 8(4) and No. 24(5) and in tune with the UGC (ODL programmes & Online Programmes) Regulations, 2020, this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is being signed between the University and the host Institution where the Learner Support Centre (LSC)/ Study Centre is housed.

In full appreciation of the aims and objectives of the University as well as its operational principles, the undersigned as the Head of

(Name of the Institution) affiliated to Located at the address:

puts on record the consent of the authorities of the Institution to house a Learner Support Centre(LSCs)/Study Centre (herein after the Centre) of the Netaji Subhas Open University (herein after the University or NSOU as it is commonly known) under the following terms and conditions:

- to make available for the said purpose necessary infrastructure such as two rooms each of size at least 600 sq ft. and provide services for efficient running of the Centre, including receiving of study materials from the University and distribution of the same to individual student;
- ii) To provide the class rooms/ seminar room as per requirements of the teaching-learning processes.
- to comply with the Rules and Regulations, which are already in force and/ or which to be introduced by the University &/or the UGC-Distance Education Bureau (DEB) &/or other statutory body(ies) as may be applicable, in respect of LSCs / Study Centres from time to time;
- iv) to run the Post Graduate LSCs / Study Centres offering Arts, Commerce & Mathematics only out of the share amount received from the University in this regard as per the norms of the University which are in force and which may be promulgated from time to time.

- v) to maintain complete records of:-
  - (a) all expenses including those incurred out of the amount received by the LSC/ Study Centre,
  - (b) student enrolment, renewal and assessment in different subjects,
  - (c) academic and supportive staff working at the LSC/ Study Centre and
  - (d) all programmes of the LSC/ Study Centre;
- vi) to conduct examinations as and when required, in consonance with the schedule announced by the University;
- vii) to send regular reports to Director, Study Centres and/or other concerned officers of the University regarding the activities, needs and progress of the LSC/ Study Centre and to allow visiting teams consisting of University authorities and/ or any person who may be authorized by the University for monitoring purposes.
- viii) All teachers (including SACT-I) of LSCs have to participate in any academic activities as and when instructed by the University.
- ix) To engage coordinator along with other supporting staff following the G.B. (of the College/HEI concerned) resolution under intimation to the Director, Study Centres, NSOU.
- It would be the responsibility of all academic counsellors attached to the LSC/ Study Centre to participate in the teaching –learning and evaluation process of NSOU viz., Personal Contact Programme (PCP) and evaluation of answer papers of the Term-End and Assignment Examinations as may be assigned to them from time to time by the concerned authority of the college/ LSC/ Study Centre and/or NSOU.
- xi) LSCs/Study Centres will have to conduct laboratory based activities /field work/dissertation/hands on training (as would be applicable) for the enrolled learners of the University as and when instructed by the University.
- xii) The Principal/Teacher-in-Charge/Officer-in-Charge and Coordinator shall abide by the provisions of the relevant sections of NSOU Statutes /Law/Regulations and other directions which may be relevant for the purpose of the smooth running of the LSCs / Study Centres.
- xiii) LSCs / Study Centres shall create a TAB in the college Website for NSOU to give all information relating to the University. All the notices and schedules relating to Admission, Renewal, Personal Contact Programme, Examinations etc will be uploaded on the relevant link (TAB) of the college website.

- xiv) The Learner Support Centre/ Study Centre will put a notice board and signboard depicting the University name and logo at a distinct place in the college premises in order to make the same visible.
- xv) It shall be the responsibility of the LSC/ Study Centres to submit the Audit Report of the grants received by them by 31st May each year.
- xvi) Programme Offered: Vide Annexure (the programmes offered by the university to the LSC/Study Centre are provided in the annexure herein and shall be treated as the part and parcel of this agreement).
- xvii) The LSCs/study centre will organize Induction Meeting before the commencement of each academic session with newly admitted students. University officials (faculties/officer) may participate in the programme whenever necessary on invitation.
- xviii) The LSCs/ study centre should strictly follow the normal working hours which are as follows::
  - Saturday (2pm to 5pm); Sunday (10.30am to 5.30pm)
- The college/Higher Education Institution will not open more than two LSCs of two different Universities including NSOU. And it shall be the duty of the college to inform the NSOU if and when the second LSC is opened and put to function.
- Neither Party will be liable for any failure or delay in performing an obligation under this Agreement that is due to any of the following causes (which events and/or circumstances are hereinafter referred to as "Force Majeure"), to the extent beyond its reasonable control: acts of God, accident, riots, war, terrorist act, epidemic, pandemic, quarantine, civil commotion, breakdown of communication facilities, breakdown of web host, breakdown of internet service provider, natural catastrophes, governmental acts or omissions, alteration, variation and repeal in laws or regulations that are in force, national strikes, fire, explosion, generalized lack of availability of raw materials or energy; provided that the parties stipulate that Force Majeure shall not include the novel coronavirus Covid-19 pandemic which is ongoing as of the date of the execution of this agreement.

For the avoidance of doubt, Force Majeure shall not include:-

- (a) financial distress nor the inability of either party to make a profit or avoid a financial loss,
- (b) changes in the market prices or conditions, or
- (c) a party's financial inability to perform its obligations hereunder.

This Force Majeure Clause applies for parties entering into the instant contract in the middest of the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic, and with restrictions imposed by the appropriate government which want to ensure that current existing circumstances at the time of execution of this agreement and/ or MOU are not considered Force Majeure events.

In case of any litigation the High Court of Calcutta, should be the xxi) authority. xxii) The Clauses on Termination of this instant agreement shall be made on mutually agreed conditions subject to the protection of learners' interest and without causing any prejudice to them who are already enrolled.
